




nuts, ice cream, cotton candy, snow cones, candy apples and many other goodies.

Community Row, featuring local vendors, will be on one side of Virginia Street on the way to the waterfront.

Shuttles, water taxis

On Saturday only, six

Parking

A portion of the parking fees offset Oyster Festival expenses and contribute to Urbanna Oyster Festival Foundation programs and its promotion of the festival. Since 1991, the foundation has sponsored the festival.

There are a number of smaller parking lots in town that will be available Friday and until 9 a.m. on Saturday.

Vehicles will be restricted from entering or leaving town between 6-8 p.m. on Friday.

Cars parked in town on Saturday will not be able to leave until the roads are re-opened at about 8 p.m.

Handicapped parking is on the west side of town and will be at the corner of Virginia Street and Red Hill Drive. It is operated by the K-9 Alert Search and Rescue Dogs, which benefits from the parking fees. Follow the signs.

Come early, stay late and wear walking shoes, because there's lots to see, hear and do at the Oyster Festival. It's all happening only in Urbanna, as it has since 1957.

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Oyster Shucking Contest is at the firehouse

The Virginia Oyster Shucking Contest, sponsored by Rappahannock Oyster Company, will start at 11 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 6, behind the Middlesex Volunteer Fire Department station (the Urbanna firehouse) at 335 Virginia St.







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Meet the Oyster Festival captains

Four Waltons named captains of 65th Urbanna Oyster Festival

The Urbanna Oyster Festival Foundation (UOFF) has named brothers and fourth generation Urbanna commercial watermen Thomas Lee, Tony and Ricky Walton and Thomas Lee's son, Lee, a fifth generation waterman, as captains of the 65th annual Urbanna Oyster Festival.

After the August storm of 1933, the Waltons' grandfather and great-grandfather, Avery Payne, moved from Tangier Island with his family to the Town of Urbanna. He worked the water and operated Payne's Crab House until his death in 1977. After his death, the brothers' mother Catherine Via and aunt Beatrice (Payne) Taylor operated the crab house at the end of Virginia Street until it closed a few years ago.

As boys, Thomas Lee, Tony and Ricky worked with their grandfather and mother at the crab house and from them they learned the ways of the water and the seafood business.

Thomas Lee founded Walton Seafood and Tony started Tony Walton's Seafood, both located just outside of Urbanna on Old Virginia Street Road. Ricky is an independent

commercial waterman who oysters and crabs and Lee runs Walton Seafood with his father, Thomas Lee.

Heritage

When Avery Payne moved to Urbanna in 1933, his guardian and adopted father Henry Dize had already left Tangier and had established a home on Howard Street in town. Anecdotal town history

has Dize as the first Urbanna waterman to harvest hard crabs using a crab pot. Trotline was the main gear form used here to harvest crabs until 1937 when Dize, who had seen the pots elsewhere, made some that were laced together with cotton twine and wire — no hog rings as they use today.

In a 1987 interview with Dize's grandson, the late Ed Payne, said that Henry, who lived on Perkins Creek, would get up early and scull over to Buster Ferguson's Seafood dock (on LaGrange Creek) and buy a box of fish for a dollar (for bait). "A box held a hundred pounds in it then. After he got his bait, he'd pole out into the river where he had 36 pots tied to wooden stakes. Granddaddy would come to a stake, tie his boat to it, pull her up, and empty her. He'd take his time. It wasn't like we are today — going as hard as we can to catch as many crabs as we can," said Ed.

"While Granddaddy was potting, Grandma each morning would run a little trotline in the creek to help out and they would ship their catch to Baltimore. A seafood truck would come to Urbanna each day to pick up crabs. In the early spring, they would get \$7.50 a bushel for jimmies (large male crabs). That was good money back then. During the summertime, the price would get as low as \$3 a bushel, and sometimes, they didn't get enough to pay freight. Times were tight, but we kids didn't know it. We were all happy-go-lucky and thought everything that shined was gold," said Ed.

Godspeed, other vessels on display

The Urbanna Oyster Festival waterfront at the Urbanna Town Marina will showcase the area's varied history and emphasize the conservation and restoration of the Chesapeake Bay.

Since its days as a crucial colonial port, Urbanna's waterfront has always been an essential part of town life. In its recent past, its docks were filled with Chesapeake Bay buyboats and deadrise workboats as watermen bought and sold oysters and crabs they had harvested.

During the festival, history comes alive at the waterfront. Festival-goers are welcome to board the square-rigged tall ship Godspeed, a replica of one of the three ships on the 1606-1607 voyage to the New World for the English Virginia Company of London. The journey resulted in the founding of Jamestown in the new Colony of Virginia.

A replica of the 1700s tall sloop Luna will also be on display. The Colonial Seaport Foundation's Jock Collamore will be on hand to talk about the full history of the Luna and answer questions about sailing in colonial times. A third vessel will be on display — the shallop Explorer, a replica of the ship John Smith used to explore the Chesapeake Bay in the early 1600s. Deltaville Maritime Museum (DMM) Special Events Coordinator Bill Powell will be on hand to talk and answer questions about DMM's building of the Explorer.

Waterfront activities

The waterfront area of the festival provides opportunities for visitors to look at the beautiful Urbanna Town Marina and harbor, learn about the marine life of the Chesapeake Bay region, and listen to live music and enjoy refreshments. Come to the waterfront to climb aboard a historic boat, examine marine creatures in touch tanks, and taste some local seafood.

A variety of hands-on exhibits from the Yorktown Watermen's Museum, the Fairfield Foundation, Chesapeake Bay Governor's School, Friends of the Rappahannock, Christchurch School, and the Tidewater Soil and Water Conservation District will also be available.

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Parades to be featured Friday and Saturday

The annual Fireman's Parade is set for 7 p.m. Friday, Nov. 4, and the Urbanna Oyster Festival Parade is set for 2 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 5.

The Fireman's Parade will wind its way through town, while the Oyster Festival Parade will bypass the main part of Virginia Street. Both parades will assemble on the west side of town.

The route of the Fireman's Parade will be as follows: from the staging on the west side of town, east on Virginia Street, left on Grace Avenue, right on Bonner Street, left on Rappahannock Avenue, right on Marston Avenue, right on Cross Street, right on Virginia Street, and return to the staging area. The judges stand will be at the Urbanna Firehouse.

The Fireman's Parade will feature 80 fire and rescue units, beauty queens and dignitaries. It is sponsored by the Middlesex Volunteer Fire Department (MVFD) of Urbanna.

The Fireman's dance follows the parade on the firehouse grounds from 8 p.m.-midnight with the band "Exit 38," which performs rock and roll, Southern rock and Motown tunes (beer garden gates open at noon on Friday). The dance is sponsored by Al Pugh Distributing with Budweiser, Bud Light, Michelob Ultra and Devils Backbone.

Saturday's Oyster Festival Parade will have more than 50 units, leading off with our honorees and grand marshal and captains, queens and spats followed by the Aqua String Band – a member of the Philadelphia Mummers String Band. A special parade guest will be Harris Ferguson carrying Deborah Pratt and Davila Redmond in his homemade tricycle with bench seating. A special treat will be Step Up Into T.L.C. traveling miles to bring smiles with their Clydesdale horse, pony and miniature horse. And, about five or six high school bands will be marching in the parade.

The route of the Oyster Festival Parade is as follows: from the staging area on the west side of town, east on Virginia Street, left on Grace Avenue, right on Bonner Street, left on Rappahannock Avenue, right on Marston Avenue, right on Cross Street, right on Prince George Street, left on Virginia Street, and return to the staging area. The judges stand will be at Virginia Street and Rappahannock Avenue, which is also the location of the festival headquarters for the weekend. Prime viewing is on Marston Avenue or Prince George Street.

Fireman's Parade history

In 1939, Urbanna residents met to organize the first Volunteer Fire Company in Middlesex County. After its organization, the new department purchased its first piece of equipment, a 500-gallon Ford pumper. The 1940 Ford, still owned by the department today, was the first and only fire truck in Middlesex.

By 1986, the parade on Saturday had gotten so large that festival officials decided to have a "Firemen's Parade" on Friday night. This exciting parade will feature more than 80 units from all over the state including everything from giant ladder trucks to small brush trucks, ambulances and historic fire vehicles from the past. The men and women participating in this parade, unselfishly serve to protect property and save lives.



PUBLIC NOTICE 2022 OYSTER FESTIVAL STREET AND PARKING RESTRICTIONS

The Virginia Department of Transportation has approved the following 2022 Urbanna Oyster Festival Street and Parking Restrictions pursuant to a Resolution of the Urbanna Town Council:

Parking Restrictions

Parking restrictions will be in effect within the corporate limits of the Town of Urbanna between 2 a.m., Friday, November 4, 2022 and 11 p.m., Saturday, November 5, 2022 in order to ensure pedestrian safety, safe movement of police, fire and rescue vehicles as well as safe parade operations. Certain streets will be opened for parking earlier than 11 p.m. Saturday depending on the progress of cleanup crews.

No Parking areas will be designated as Tow Away Zones and towing will be at the owner's expense. The no parking-tow away zones for both sides of the streets in Urbanna include:

Urbanna Road from the bridge to the Watling St intersection. Watling St from its intersection with Urbanna Rd at the traffic triangle to Cross St. Cross St from its intersection with Watling St all the way past Marston Ave intersection. Prince George St from Cross St to Virginia St. Virginia St east from Waverly Rd to Oyster Rd. Marston Ave from Cross St to Rappahannock Ave. Rappahannock Ave south from the Marston Ave intersection to Virginia St. Marston Ave east from Cross St to first house on each side of street. Bonner St west from Rappahannock Ave to Linden Ave. Grace Avenue from Bonner St to Virginia St. Park St from Rappahannock Ave to Linden Ave. Upton Lane by the Post Office, Hilliard St, Rappahannock Ave, Cross St, Oyster Rd, Prince George St and Kent St in their entirety.

Parade Routes and Times

The Friday, November 4, 2022, Fireman's Parade will begin at 7 p.m. and commence east on Virginia Street from the area of the Urbanna Professional Center, left on Grace Street, right on Bonner Street, left on Rappahannock Avenue, right on Marston Avenue, right on Cross Street, right on Virginia Street to a disband area where the parade began. The Saturday, November 5, 2022, Oyster Festival Parade will begin at 2 p.m. and will commence east from the staging and formation area at the Waverly Commons Office Building on Virginia Street, left on Grace Street, right on Bonner Street, left on Rappahannock Avenue, right on Prince George Street, left on Virginia Street to the disband area where the parade began.

Urbanna Street Restrictions

Other Restrictions: On Friday, November 4, and Saturday, November 5, 2022, law enforcement authorities may close selected streets to routine traffic as crowd and public safety actions dictate.

Town Entrance Restrictions

Friday, November 4, 2022, vehicular traffic entering or leaving the Town will be prohibited beginning at 5 p.m. on the west side (Route 602) in the vicinity of Lord Mott Road and beginning at 6 p.m. on the east side (Route 227) in the vicinity of Rosegill for the Fireman's Parade. These Routes will be closed to all traffic attempting to enter the Town of Urbanna except to facilitate the movement of police and emergency vehicles. The Town of Urbanna will remain closed until 9 p.m. or later depending on pedestrian traffic.

Saturday, November 5, 2022, 9 a.m. or earlier if deemed necessary by law enforcement authorities, State Route 227 (Urbanna Road) will be closed in the vicinity of the Molly's Way, and State Route 602 (Virginia Street) will be closed in the vicinity of Red Hill Drive. These Routes will be closed to all traffic attempting to enter the Town of Urbanna except to facilitate the movement of police and emergency vehicles. The Town of Urbanna will remain closed until 8 p.m. or later depending on pedestrian traffic. At any time, law enforcement authorities may temporarily close the Town to routine traffic as crowd and public safety actions dictate.

Golf Carts are not allowed in the Festival Area.





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
